Through interdisciplinary dialogue and exchange, the forum seeks to identify both shared concerns and distinctive trajectories within Asian scholarship. By highlighting key themes and opportunities for future collaboration, it

aspires to lay the groundwork for sustainable and mutually enriching academic partnerships across Asia.

Nidhi Maini

Ph.D in East Asian Studies from Department of East Asian Studies, University of Delhi. Currently teaching Japanese Language at St. Stephen's College and Hansraj College. Previously taught as Guest Faculty (Japanese Studies) at Department of East Asian Studies. Research area: Women magazines and Consumption patterns in Interwar Japan with a special focus on cosmetics, sewing machines and bicycles. Certified TESOL Trainer with 10+ years of experience. Completed Japanese Language Teacher Training Course conducted by Ministry of External Affairs and Embassy of Japan. Recipient of JENESYS and TEEP scholarship for research in Taiwan. Currently working on comparative analysis of Indian and Japanese women magazines.

Nam Ki-jeong

Professor and Director, Institute for Japanese Studies, Seoul National University. from the Department of International Relations, Seoul National University; Ph.D. in International Relations, Graduate School of Arts and Sciences, University of Tokyo. Formerly Associate Professor and Professor, Faculty of Law, Tohoku University; Associate Professor, School of International Studies, Kookmin University (Korea). Has served as President of the Association for Modern Japanese Studies and the Korean Association for Political and Diplomatic History. His research focuses on Japanese politics and diplomacy, particularly the Japan–U.S. Alliance, within the context of Northeast Asian international politics, and he is also interested in peace movements in Japanese civil society.

Chen Tzu-ching

Professor of Japanese Language at the School of Humanities and Social Sciences, and the Master's Program in Applied Language Studies, Kainan University, Taoyuan, Taiwan. PhD in Applied Linguistics (March 2003) from the School of Japanese Studies in a Global Perspective, Ochanomizu University, Tokyo, Japan. Masters in Literature (March 1999) from the Department of Human Sciences, Shinshu University, Japan. Bachelor in Japanese Literature (July 1995), Department of Japanese Language and Japanese Literature, Fu-Jen Catholic University, Taipei, Taiwan. Her current research focuses on several key areas: attitude formation in language learning, the relationship between metacognition and learning outcomes, integration of digital technology in language pedagogy, and fostering learners' practical language proficiency while promoting autonomous learning.

Hoshina Teruyuki

As the Deputy of the Japan Foundation New Delhi, Hoshina is responsible for Japanese studies and Global Partnerships (international dialogue). After joining the Japan Foundation Tokyo in 2000, he has been stationed at its New Delhi office from 2003 to 2011 and from 2024 to the present. He has been closely observing the trends in Japanese studies in India from the perspective of the Japan Foundation.

Presentation Abstracts

Japanese Studies in India: Growth, Opportunities and Cultural Exchange

Nidhi Maini

Japanese Studies in India has witnessed a substantial transformation over the past few decades, evolving from a limited language focused discipline to a vibrant multi-disciplinary field. Contemporary Japanese Studies now encompasses diverse areas including language, literature, culture, society, geo-politics, economics, and policy studies. Strengthening of India- Japan bilateral relations has expanded academic interest in Japan across universities and research institutions in India. Government

initiatives, industry demand for Japanese language professionals and cross-cultural understanding has furthered the scope and relevance of this discipline, calling for robust academic engagement and institutional collaboration.

This presentation examines the historical evolution, current trends, opportunities and future potential for Japanese Studies in India with a special focus on Department of East Asian Studies, University of Delhi. It outlines the challenges and impediments to the growth of Japanese Studies in India, emphasizing that the discipline serves as a vital and strategic bridge in strengthening the long term engagement between India and Japan. It argues that the future of the discipline lies in fostering institutional partnerships, expanding regional participation and encouraging collaborative research frameworks for advanced knowledge production.

The Development and Future of Japanese Studies in Korea — Seoul National University's Initiative and the Turn to "Post-Area Studies"

Nam Ki-jeong

This presentation examines the trajectory and future direction of Japanese Studies in Korea through the experience of the Institute for Japanese Studies at Seoul National University (SNU). As the post-Cold War global order weakens and exclusion, conflict, and uncertainty intensify, universal theories centered on global politics have become less capable of explaining contemporary realities. In this context, the region has re-emerged as a critical unit of analysis. The issue, however, is not a simple return to traditional area studies, but an effort to move beyond their epistemological and methodological limits on the basis of accumulated regional knowledge—an approach referred to here as “post-area studies.” Japanese Studies in Korea has historically approached Japan through multiple and overlapping perspectives: as an object of vigilance, a source of learning, and a partner with whom reconciliation remains possible. Since its establishment in 2004, the SNU Institute for Japanese Studies has sought to analyze Japan not through one-dimensional images but as a complex “life-world” integrating politics, economy, society, and culture. This orientation has generated diverse research outputs, including publication series, academic journals, and long-term collaborative projects. Recent

research frames Japan as a mature, shrinking, and high-risk society, treating its experience as an analytical lens for global challenges such as prolonged low growth, demographic aging, climate crisis, and democratic instability. By critically engaging growth-centered modernization while exploring new forms of social practice and solidarity, this approach contributes to international scholarship and to the construction of knowledge oriented toward reconciliation in East Asia.

The Status and Trends of Japanese Studies and Japanese Language Education in Taiwan: Toward Constructing a Japan-Taiwan-India Academic Network

Chen Tzuching

This presentation examines the current status and trends of Japanese Studies and Japanese language education in Taiwan. Based on the latest comprehensive statistical data and student mobility surveys, it clarifies Taiwan's unique position in East Asia. The analysis highlights how Taiwan's robust academic infrastructure, particularly in higher education, serves as a vital foundation for Japanese Studies as a field of area studies.

Furthermore, by reviewing research trends within Taiwan's major academic associations, the author organizes the expanding scope of interest—ranging from linguistics and literature to social culture and education—to examine the evolving landscape of Japanese Studies in Taiwan. Finally, the presentation explores the potential for academic exchange between Taiwan and India. By analyzing the trends of Indian students in Taiwan and contrasting the educational structures of the two regions, the author identifies significant room for growth and examines the implications of Taiwan's educational expertise for the development of Japanese Studies in India. The session concludes by envisioning how language education can serve as a catalyst for mutual understanding and a foundation for constructing a trilateral academic network among Japan, Taiwan, and India. This research aims to demonstrate how regional expertise can facilitate broader international academic cooperation in Asian Japanese studies.

The Japan Foundation and Academic Network Building in South Asia

Hoshina Teruyuki

Among Japanese studies scholars and researchers in South Asian countries, there has been a growing momentum in recent years to deepen mutual networks, which led to the establishment of Japanese Studies Association in South Asia (JSASA) in 2023. By chance, although not in South Asia, the Japan Foundation Tokyo has started the JFIPP program for 2023 to share issues across the Asia-Pacific region. This presentation will introduce these trends as a place for individual expert to strengthen their networks.
